



Living Between Reformation Day - All Saints Day - Thanksgiving Day

As I write November's article, the autumn sun is shining brightly after we've just experienced days of torrential rainfall. The COVID-19 pandemic is still on the rise and the fear of this dreaded deathly virus is still upon us. Yet, I find myself looking forward to being stretched between Reformation Day (October 31st), with its rediscovery of God's Grace and the TRUTH of God's Word in the Scriptures (revealing God's will for us through Christ). Then, on the other side, I am pondering All Saints Day (November 1st) with its emphasis on remembering and celebrating those Saints in Christ who have gone on before us and who served as inspirational mentors for our Christian life. And then of course, that special time Thanksgiving Day (November 26), a day when we are to be especially grateful and thankful for all we have.

Reformation Day is a Protestant Christian religious holiday celebrated on (October 31st). According to Philip Melanchthon, October 31, 1517 was the day a German monk Martin Luther nailed his *Ninety-five Theses* on the door of the All Saints' Church in Wittenberg, Electorate of Saxony in the Holy Roman Empire. Historians argue that Luther may have

chosen All Hallows' Eve on purpose to get the attention of common people, although that has never been proven.

All Hallows' Eve, or All Saints' Eve, is a celebration observed in many countries on October 31st (also known as a secular holiday Halloween). The eve of the Western Christian feast of All Hallows' Day (three-days) is dedicated to remembering the dead, including saints (hallows), martyrs, and all the faithful departed.

All Saint's Day is also significant for Lutheran and Calvinist Churches. The Roman Catholic Church recently started recognizing it; representatives in ecumenical spirit often attend various events held by Protestants. It is officially recognized in Germany and sovereign countries of Slovenia and Chile. Also, countries like Switzerland and Austria provide specifics pertaining to Protestant churches, while not officially proclaiming it a nationwide holiday.

Thanksgiving is a national holiday celebrated on various dates in the United States, Canada, Brazil, Grenada, Saint Lucia, and Liberia, and the sub-national entities Leiden, Norfolk Island, and Puerto Rico. It began as a day of giving thanks for the blessing of the harvest and of the preceding year. Germany and Japan have a similar named holiday. Thanksgiving has historical religious roots and cultural traditions; and yet, has long been celebrated as a secular holiday.

Reading history about passed down traditions are fun -- and they really do matter. It gives us the opportunity to grow in our faith and count the cost to others regarding the Reformation, All Saints and Thanksgiving traditions passed down to us. And that is where the Reformation, All Saints and Thanksgiving meet; it comes together when we like our forefathers are inspired and challenged to pass onto others what has been passed onto us. We like them are to live lives of faith (that mentor others) and make a difference in the lives of others around us.

However, it is the living in-between these times that becomes difficult. How do we draw all these special days together? How do we continue to carry on past traditions? Even in the midst of a pandemic and the chaos that surrounds us? I find the text for All Saints Sunday helpful: *The Sermon on the Mount* from (Matthew 5:1-12 NIV) helpful. Here we read Jesus' simple, almost impossible guide to our living saintly lives (even in times of unrest).

In the Beatitudes, Jesus said:

- ³"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- ⁴ Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.
- ⁵ Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.
- ⁶ Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.
- ⁷ Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.
- ⁸ Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.
- ⁹ Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.
- ¹⁰ Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. ¹¹ Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me. ¹² Rejoice and be glad, because great is your

reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

In Luke's Gospel, Jesus makes it even more difficult (Luke 6:27-31NIV): ²⁷"But to you who are listening I say: **Love your enemies**, do good to those who hate you, ²⁸ bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you. ²⁹ If someone slaps you on one cheek, turn to them the other also. If someone takes your coat, do not withhold your shirt from them. ³⁰ Give to everyone who asks you, and if anyone takes what belongs to you, do not demand it back. ³¹ Do to others as you would have them do to you."

Jesus' outline of the Sermon on the Mount and its simple, love and faith-based life is such a worthy Reformational challenge; it is a Saintly way of living and it is a time for Thanksgiving. Living in the reality of the in-between moments of our life can be a challenge, but I believe and predict all of YOU are up for the challenge (even during a pandemic)! Blessings, this month of November, take time this year to treasure your religious roots and ethnic traditions.

Indoor Worship Beginning on November 1st @ 10:00am

Indoor weekly worship services will resume by gathering in the sanctuary in a socially distanced way. The service will continue to be broadcast by radio to the parking lot and offered online as a youtube worship service by the next day. A recorded cd of the service will remain available upon request.

How to prepare for our Indoor Worship:

- 1. The following people who are at high risk of severe illness from COVID-19 are encouraged to stay home and continue to worship with us by watching our YouTube service or stay in your car. High risk people of any age who have serious underlying medical conditions, including those who are immunocompromised or who have chronic lung disease, severe asthma, serious heart conditions, severe obesity, and chronic diseases should also consider not attending indoors.
- 2. If you have experienced any of the following symptoms within the week prior to the service, please stay home for your safety:

Fever of 100 degrees or higher Cough or sore throat Shortness of breath Close contact with anyone confirmed to have COVID-19 (in the past 14 days)

- 3. Remember your mask before leaving home, face coverings will be required.
- 4. You will be emailed a waiver prior to coming. Remember your signed form before leaving home, it will be required. Ushers will have one if needed.

What to do when you arrive for our Indoor Worship:

While you are on the grounds, we ask you to practice social distancing and maintain a minimum of 6 feet between you and other congregants outside of your household.

- 1. Upon arrival park in the spots that have the red X's which are placed every other parking space. X's are placed on the sidewalk for social distancing as well.
- 2. Entry to the service will be through the front double doors to the sanctuary. We ask attendees to not use the other doors and hallways to access the sanctuary. Exit will be out the side sanctuary door only.
- 3. Masks must be worn entering and while seated in the sanctuary. If you forget your mask before leaving home, ushers will be able to provide you with one.
- 4. Ushers will be available at the entry sidewalk to assist with check-in. Everyone will need to check-in for temperature test, attendance and health traceability record keeping and turn in the one-time waiver.
- 5. Baskets for offerings will be available at both sanctuary entry and exit doors for drop off by attendee.
- 6. Hand sanitizer will be available at both sanctuary entry and exit doors.
- 7. If collecting for a mission project, attendees will place items in the grocery cart or other designated container.

- 8. Single-use bulletins with Scripture, Liturgy and Hymn lyrics, etc. are handed out by ushers (sanitized hands/wear gloves). No hymnal use at this time. Attendees are to take bulletins when leaving or place in receptacle at the exit.
- 9. When entering for seating, please proceed to the center isle and go in any open pew (every other pew is blocked and marked to ensure safe distancing). Only sit with family and those in your close contact circle/bubble. On each pew, ensure each family unit remains 6+ feet from other congregants.
- 10. When worship is over you will exit your pew as directed by usher. Remain seated until your row is selected to leave.

What to expect during our Indoor Worship:

Worship: The length of the service was shortened for the outdoor service and will continue with the same format for now. The entire service is in the single use bulletin which we ask you to take with you when you leave. Do not leave in pews.

Communion: Communion for indoor services continue in the same way as outdoors: you will receive Communion elements in a pre-packaged/pre-consecrated kit upon arrival. We will all partake at the same time where you are seated.

Choir, Handbells and Band: There will be no groups at this time. Soloist placed at proper distance may be used. Phyllis Little will return to play piano/organ.

Restrooms: Have been sanitized prior to service. You will be required to sanitize your hands on the way in and out of the restrooms. Only one person or family at a time in the restroom.

Nursery: There will be no nursery at this time. Please bring quiet activities.

We look so forward to seeing you again at our Indoor Worship!

There will be NO Christmas Eve services this year due to restrictions with COVID-19 as we strive to provide safety for the community and our members.

One of the future projects that the Stewardship Committee and others have inquired about is having our sanctuary pews recovered. This summer I contacted a company in NC that specializes in all types of church renovations and furnishings to get an idea of the cost to reupholster our pews. The quote to install new foam padding and recover the pews was \$6,940.00. That's about \$315.00 per pew which is very reasonable.

After a discussion about this with several members a family came forward and offered to do this for the church. You heard that right: someone is going to take care of the cost of this. The project was taken to the Church Board who has approved the donation and project. What a wonderful donation from a family that wishes to remain anonymous.

We are in the early stages of the process to have this done. The time frame has not been determined yet and depends on fabric availability. Color selection will be comparable to what we have now so that it will work with the carpet. Hopefully they can start in the next few months. The pews would be recovered on site and during the week.

Once again, we have been blessed by a generous contribution from a church family. The Stewardship Committee will keep you posted.

Who is Carolina Caring? What do they do?

Please take a minute to read about one of our neighbors.

Carolina Caring was founded in 1979 and is an independent, community-based, non-profit health care provider. We specialize in programs that offer relief from chronic conditions, serious illness and the challenges they bring including palliative medicine, hospice care and grief counseling.

Currently, we serve 12 counties across western North Carolina and the Piedmont. In 2019, we launched Cardinal Kids, a health care program dedicated to helping children and their families facing challenges of serious illness by providing hospice and palliative care for children from birth to young adulthood. Cardinal Kids also provides social and spiritual support to the children's families.

A Perspective by Pam Prevatte, President Provincial Women's Board Moravian Church in America, Southern Province

I was recently asked to write about the Provincial Women's Board of the Southern Province. This group began as the Provincial Women's Committee and was authorized by the Provincial Synod of 1926. It was reorganized as the Provincial Women's Board by the Provincial Synod of 1944. Since its beginning, 25 women have served as President of the Provincial Women's Board. I am honored and blessed to be currently serving as the 26th president which is my 5th year on the board. I have been so lucky to learn from 2 great presidents before me and many wonderful women who love serving God and our Moravian Church.

It is difficult to quickly explain what this board does. I believe the most important task is in supporting Moravian women in the Southern Province. One of our mandates from Synod is "To further the cause of Christ and the Kingdom among the women of our Southern Province."

We support financially and/or spiritually the Board of Cooperative Ministries, Board of World Mission, Church Women United, Elizabeth Norfleet Miller Endowment Fund, Laurel Ridge Moravian Camp, Minister's Emergency Fund, Salemtowne, Seminary Student Emergency Fund, Sunnyside Ministries, Tamra Wright Thomas Spiritual Life Retreat Scholarship Fund, Unity Women's Desk, and the Yokefellow Prison Ministry. We communicate with Moravian female pastors and Women's Fellowships and publish a quarterly newsletter that Women's Fellowships are encouraged to use to share what is happening in their churches. Each newly ordained Southern Province minister receives a portable communion set from the board. We also provide a Bible Study and Mission Study book each year for Women's Fellowship circles. Many individuals also enjoy these books.

At the start of my tenure as president, I did not foresee that a pandemic would change everything that the board usually does. The Spiritual Life Retreat and the Fall Celebration are 2 events that the board presents annually. The board meets and conducts much business at 5 or 6 meetings each year. Also, we have assigned committees that meet and plan for how we serve the groups we support. All of this had to stop. We needed to change. That was my first task as a new president.

As a retired high school English teacher, the hardest lesson I ever had to learn was in planning lessons. No matter how much time I spent doing this and no matter how interesting I tried to make it, no lesson is ever going to go as you think it will. I had to learn to change course in the middle of a lesson, and I certainly had to revamp my ideas before 2nd period arrived. It was my job to make sure my lessons were the best they could be.

Much like my lesson as a teacher, the Provincial Women's Board has had to change. First of all, I had very little to do with it. The Board is a working board and consists of women who love God and love to serve. They have creative ideas and figure out all sorts of ways to do things.

We have held 3 outside meetings and will Zoom our meeting on November 12. But even before November 12, things are happening. We have not lost sight of what our purpose is and who we are serving. We were able to hold the Fall Celebration on August 29 which is available on PWB Facebook page. It is worthwhile to watch even if you are not using the study book.

We have hope that we will be able to have the Spiritual Life Retreat at Laurel Ridge in April, 2021. We may not be able to give the residents at Salemtowne a Valentine's Day party, but we can provide them with treats. We are planning to utilize more technology in reaching anyone with interest in what we do. We are also hoping to get more input from all Moravian churches to share through our newsletter.

I am also a member of the Interprovincial Women's Board which is made up of 4 each from Northern and Southern Provinces. We meet annually to plan the Women's Conference which is held every 4 years and to select the book study we have each year. This year, 2 weeks before we were to leave for the usual West Virginia location, we were notified that the facility was not taking guests from out of state because of the pandemic. The staff at Laurel Ridge helped us to quickly plan a safe meeting and weekend stay at Higgins Lodge. We were the only 8 people there for the weekend. We had a great time. We made and took our food with us. You know we ate well. The weather was beautiful and the leaves were beginning to change. We also had a productive meeting.

I am thoroughly enjoying being a part of this group. I look forward to the future and what it will bring. I look at this committee as a blessing provided by God. I never want to lose sight that I am serving Him.
