Jesus Resurrection Should Be Celebrated Every Day!

April has arrived and this year Sunday April 4, 2021 amidst the lengthy pandemic; we will celebrate Easter COVID style. The long-awaited day for many Christians arrives; this year due to COVID, we will only have one worship service for Easter @ 10:00AM. As Christians gather for their traditional Easter Morning Worship Service... I say: "The Lord is Risen! Then the congregation echoes, "The Lord is Risen indeed!"

Easter is the day Christians all across the world celebrate Jesus RESURRECTION. This great day of celebration comes after, we as Christians, have experienced and traveled forty days on our lengthy Lenten journey through Holy Week. Despite COVID, we each night via the New Hope YouTube video we experienced Jesus' journey to the Cross together in our homes.

This year despite COVID, we still celebrated Shrove Tuesday, Ash Wednesday, and Holy Week. This year (our readings each night was read by our members) and recorded for YouTube viewing. Our "Upper Room" experience also looked a little different this year for Maundy Thursday with Communion... Just as Jesus and His disciples came together, we too gathered in our own individual homes to partake with friends, family and spouses. Yes, we were not in the Church, but we were united together by God's love and spirit, as we partook of the blessed Sacraments. We received Jesus' words, "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins" (Matthew 26:28NIV).

Then, as is our tradition, we continued our journey of Holy Week by celebrating our Good Friday Lovefeast (this year) in our homes. On Good Friday, we once again traveled to the foot of the Cross where, we heard, Jesus echoing cry of, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me" Mark 15:34 NIV.

Our Lenten journey this year has stretched us and made us need to be more flexible. Yet, the journey for Jesus to the Cross that He would bear for each of us was the same. We have heard the words of finality that Jesus spoke with His last breath, "It is finished!" (John 19:30). Friends, Jesus paid our sin debt in full; Jesus paid a sin debt we could not pay for ourselves. Fortunately, we are no longer separated from God the Father. Our Lenten journey this year also took us to the empty tomb to hear again the story of the women who traveled there early in the morning; to find the tomb empty. We heard once more the words of the angels at the empty tomb, "He is not here, but has risen" (Luke 24:6).

So, now what do we do? Where do we go from here? The pivotal culmination of God's life-changing Day of Jesus Resurrection is over; or is it...? Brothers and Sisters, Easter, is so much more than just one day. Jesus' Resurrection Day should be an essential part of every Sunday worship celebration we have. And not just on Sunday's during worship; We should celebrate Jesus "RESURRECTION" every day of our lives. When we come to worship on Sunday, we should come to collectively receive once more the fruit of the Cross and the Resurrection of Jesus — as we also come receiving the sure forgiveness of our sins and the certainty of our eternal life with God.

Jesus RESURRECTION and EASTER should be celebrated "every day" as we live with HOPE trusting in God through Christ. "Every day" should be a day of celebration, knowing Jesus is "the RESURRECTION and the LIFE" (John 11:25). It is worthy for us to remember that God the Father sent His Beloved Son Jesus...to die on the Cross for our sins; He paid a sin debt we could not pay for ourselves. Jesus Christ is our only "HOPE"!

So what do we do after celebrating the empty tomb and "Jesus Resurrection"? We follow the example of the first witnesses of the empty tomb. After the two angels reminded Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women that Jesus had risen, the Gospel of Luke tells us "they remembered the words and returning from the tomb they told all these things to the eleven and to all the rest" (Luke 24:8-9). They went forth from the tomb changed by the Resurrection of Jesus. They went forth from the tomb to share their witness of God's power over sin, death and Satan himself; to others.

So, where do we go... and what do we do now? We are to follow the example of Jesus' first disciples. After Jesus walked through locked doors to appear to the eleven disciples and to show Himself to Thomas, seven of the eleven disciples went back to their fishing business (John 21:1-14). They went back to their vocations and took the witness of Christ RESURRECTION with them. They lived "every day" in joy and celebration of the RESURRECTION of Jesus, by carrying out their discipleship duties and responsibilities.

Perhaps, this year, most of all with all we have experienced, we need to stop and think how grateful we are. Like the women at the empty tomb and the eleven disciples, we too need to make it our lifelong task to tell others about Jesus. We too need to be "every day" witnesses to Jesus RESURRECTION. As Jesus true disciples, we need to share the HOPE we have of "eternal life" because of Christ Jesus our Lord and Savior!

Like the women at the empty tomb and the eleven disciples, we need to take every opportunity we have to reach out to those in our homes, workplaces and community. We

have been given the task of spreading the "Good News" of Jesus Christ to the world around us. God has given to each of us an "eternal gift" to share with others. Most of us are not fishermen, but all of us have a particular calling on our life. Our calling can be father, husband, mother, wife, son, daughter, brother, sister, grandparent, employee, retiree, friend, and neighbor. We are all called to celebrate Jesus RESURRECTION by sharing God's grace and mercy. We are to celebrate and communicate it "every day" by sharing God's joy, love, peace, and forgiveness through Christ. We are to live "every day" with Christ-like joy and celebration of Jesus RESURRECTION. We are to share "every day" the words of our Easter Morning Liturgy and our hymn of celebration that declares Jesus Resurrection: *Sing Hallelujah, Praise the Lord!* (MBW#94 & 543)

Sing hallelujah, praise the Lord!
Sing with a cheerful voice;
Exalt our God with one accord,
And in His Name rejoice.
Ne'er cease to sing, thou ransomed host,
Praise Father, Son and Holy Ghost,
Until in realms of endless light
Your praises shall unite.

There we to all eternity
Shall join the angelic lays
And sing in perfect harmony
To God our Savior's praise;
He hath redeemed us by His blood,
And made us kings and priests to God,
For us, for us, the Lamb was slain!

Worship Indoors Starting



April 4, 2021 @ 10:00AM

Weekly worship services will resume by gathering in the sanctuary in a safe and socially distanced way. The service will continue to be broadcast by radio to the parking lot and offered online as a youtube video service by the next day. A recorded CD of the service will remain available upon request.

Easter is the time of rebirth...What a wonderful way to celebrate. EASTER MORNING with ALL of us returning to WORSHIP in NEW HOPE'S Sanctuary... With its newly recovered pews!

How to prepare for our Indoor Worship:

- 1. The following **people who are at high risk** of severe illness from COVID-19 are encouraged to stay home and continue to worship with us by watching our YouTube video service or may stay in their car in the parking lot. High risk people of any age who have serious underlying medical conditions, including those who are immunocompromised or who have chronic lung disease, severe asthma, serious heart conditions, severe obesity, and chronic diseases should also consider <u>not attending Indoor Worship</u>. We recommend Parking Lot Worship on FM 87.90.
- 2. If you have experienced any of the following symptoms within the week prior to the service, please stay home for your safety and others:

Fever of 100 degrees or higher Cough or sore throat Shortness of breath Close contact with anyone confirmed to have COVID-19 (in the past 14 days)

- 3. Remember your mask before leaving home, face coverings will be required.
- 4. You will be emailed a waiver prior to coming. Remember your signed form before leaving home, it will be required. Ushers will have one if needed. (If you signed the waiver already you do not have to do sign again)

What to do when you arrive for our Indoor Worship:

While you are on the grounds, we ask you to practice social distancing and maintain a minimum of 6 feet between you and other congregants outside of your household.

- 1. Upon arrival park in the spots that have the X's which are placed every other parking space. X's are placed on the sidewalk for social distancing as well. If no X's be sure to park every other spot.
- 2. Entry to the service will be through the front double doors to the sanctuary. We ask attendees to not use

- the other doors and hallways to access the sanctuary. Exit will be out the side sanctuary door only.
- 3. Masks must be worn entering and while seated in the sanctuary. If you forget your mask before leaving home, ushers will be able to provide you with one.
- 4. Ushers will be available at the entry sidewalk to assist with check-in. Everyone will need to check-in for temperature test, attendance and health traceability record keeping and turn in/sign the one-time waiver.
- 5. Baskets for offerings will be available at both sanctuary entry and exit doors for drop off by attendee.
- 6. Hand sanitizer will be available at both sanctuary entry and exit doors.
- 7. If collecting for a mission project, attendees will place items in the grocery cart or other designated container.
- 8. Single-use bulletins with Scripture, Liturgy and Hymn lyrics, etc. are handed out by ushers (sanitized hands/wear gloves). No hymnal use at this time. Attendees are to take bulletins and other inserts when leaving or place in receptacle at the exit.
- 9. When entering for seating, please proceed up the center isle and go in any open pew (every other pew is blocked and marked to ensure safe distancing). Only sit with family and those in your close contact circle/bubble. On each pew, ensure each family unit remains 6+ feet from other congregants.
- 10. When worship is over you will exit your pew as directed by usher. Remain seated until your row is selected to leave out the front side sanctuary door.

What to expect during our Indoor Worship:

Worship: The entire service is in the single use bulletin which we ask you to take with you when you leave. Do not leave in pews.

Communion: Communion for indoor services continue in the same way as outdoors: you will receive Communion elements in a pre-packaged/pre-consecrated kit upon arrival. We will all partake at the same time where you are seated or in the car.

Choir, Handbells and Band: There will be no groups at this time. Soloist placed at proper distance may be used. The play piano will be used.

Restrooms: Have been sanitized prior to service. You will be required to sanitize your hands on the way in and out of the restrooms. Only one person or family at a time in the restroom.

Nursery: There will be no nursery at this time. Please bring quiet activities.

Please Note: New Hope congregation now has (three ways) of receiving worship:

- 1. Radio Transmitting through FM 87.90- in New Hope's parking lot. Tip- Bring transistor
- 2. Indoor worship- inside Sanctuary- safely spaced physically (six feet or more apart)
- 3. YouTube Video- usually posted by Sunday evening. Link sent by email.

We look forward to seeing ALL of you Easter Sunday at our Indoor Worship!

Flowers for Easter Service

Prayer & Gratitude Slips: Once again you are offered special colorful slips to list your prayer concerns or thoughts of gratitude. You may roll them up and place them on the cross outside the sanctuary by Easter morning. Just place them between the flowers and wire. These are confidential. Only Pastor Betty Helms removes them.

Archives Sunday 2021 is April 25 and the Archives Needs Your Help!

Since 1753, documenting our churches, our families, our communities, the Moravian Archives has been the official repository for records of the Moravian Church in America, Southern Province. The first records in our collection began with the establishment of the first southern Moravian settlement in 1753 at Bethabara, then Bethania in 1759, and Salem in 1766, and continue uninterrupted to the present. The primary mission of the Archives is to serve the Southern Province Moravian churches by collecting, cataloging and safekeeping these records. Additionally, the Archives makes many of its holdings available for research by genealogists, academics, cultural institutions, and the general public. Indeed, the Archives is an important source of historical information for the greater Winston-Salem area.

Originally, Moravians kept detailed records to maintain ties with Church leadership in the Moravian "center" of Herrnhut, Germany, and later with the settlements in Bethlehem, PA and other places. However, the collections of the Archives represent a treasure-trove of historical information about life in the Southern Province of the Moravian Church, including diaries, church member information, funeral memoirs, church government, orders of worship, an extensive collection of music, and reports from the world-wide missionary work of the Moravian Church, including the work with the native American Cherokees.
